What is a Parent Mentor?

Parents of children with disabilities, who are employed on a part-time basis by their local school system to advise, educate and support families of children with disabilities regarding special education. Parent Mentors work with and develop collaborative partnerships among parents, educators, agency personnel and community members.

How can a Parent Mentor help me?

A few examples of ways a Parent Mentor can assist you include:

- Assist families and educators in locating information and resources.
- Provide workshops for parents and educators.
- Provide confidential support for parental concerns and questions.
- Provide articles, resource/information sheets and website
- Provide information on the special education process of referral, evaluation and placement.
- Provide accurate information through system educators and programs about rights and responsibilities under IDEA.
- Assist parents in preparing for Individual Education Program (IEP) meetings to enable them to be an active member of the team.
- Provide a parent's perspective to educators.



Contact Your Parent Mentor

You can ask your teacher to have the Parent Mentor contact you or choose to contact the Parent Mentor on your own.

- If you would like to talk with another parent regarding your child
